

Things to talk about

- •Ajay longs to be a journalist. What do journalists do and do you think it is an important job?
- •How does local politician Mrs Shania behave after the Mumbai Sun writes the story about the demolition of the slum? What is her role in connection with this?
- •Chapter 17 explores some important questions regarding the factory where Yasmin works. What do you think the author is highlighting here?

•Design a newspaper front page with the main feature being on an issue that you feel strongly about.

•According to the charity unicef, 'Every 5 minutes a child arrives at a railway platform in India alone and vulnerable'. Do some research on India's Railway Children. Where do they come from and why? What does their future look like?
